## On Networking and Invitational Events

On the United Church of Christ website and in a number of printed materials about the U.C.C. the names of our four predecessor denominations are used as descriptors of who we are today: **Congregational, Christian, Evangelical** and **Reformed**. **Christian**, of course, we worship our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, the very image of the invisible God, God of God, Triune—the whole nine yards. **Reformed**, yes, our theological heritage is rooted in the Protestant Reformations of Luther, Calvin and Zwingli (look them up, you'll recognize their practices and most of their beliefs as our own). **Congregational**, that is, our churches are governed by the people and for the people; the congregational vote has the final say on matters of doctrine, theology and practice. Finally, **Evangelical**, which means that we are messengers of the Good News of God's love for all people.

It is this last word, "Evangelical", that many of us have a little hesitation claiming as our own. It conjures up unpleasant images of sidewalk preachers, of aggressive religious folks asking strangers "friend, are you born again?" Its most recent use has been connected to churches who were "fundamentalist" and "literal" interpreters of scripture. However, the word, "Evangelical" has deeper roots and ultimately much more important qualities than we have been led to believe. Being Evangelical is about sharing the Good News, its about being sent by God's love for the world as a witness of what Christ has done for all of us. But Christians of all kinds have given "the E word" a bad name; out of their own arrogance or pride, with condemnation and harsh

judgment toward those who were different.

The term, **Evangelical**, has become so connected to churches with whom we really have little connection that we have begun to use other words in order to get across similar ideas without the negative baggage. In the "Turnaround Church" program with which our church has been participating since the beginning of the year, we talk little about evangelism, but we talk a lot about "networking". Most of us are familiar with the term "networking" from the secular world. In the church too, its crucial to make contacts and develop connections with people in a wide variety of settings. "Turnaround Churches" focus in on the importance of your pastor and all of us making contacts with folks in the community beyond the church walls. We want to build community and friendships and if an opportunity to talk about how great our church is, and "you would love it there" comes along- that's great. Folks won't know what a nice church we have, filled with such good people, unless we tell them. Part of "networking" is being actively invitational. The days of passively waiting for folks to notice us in our pretty building have passed us by. In order to make ourselves known we have to take the initiative and seek out people with whom we want to share the meaningful worship, enjoyable fellowship and inspiring faith we find within our church community. It is up to each of us! No sign is going to do it, no Ad in the Sunday Shopper, no webpage is going to be enough for us to grow—you and I both need to do it!

Along with networking there is a call for the church and its members to have more "invitational events". These are activities and events, usually small, fun, normal kinds of things with opportunities for one-on-one conversation and relationship

building. Whether its dinner out with friends, a tailgate party, bowling, golfing, seeing a movie or just an invitation for dessert. These can be opportunities to introduce people to other church members and opportunities to invite them to the next event—another dinner out, or Sunday School, or the Cookie Sale, or watch the Christmas parade from the steps of the church, or “we’ve got a special Sunday coming up, how about we go together” and then, “hey, isn’t that Pastor Scott? Let me introduce you!”

Its not too difficult to imagine wanting to tell your friends and family about something you enjoy and something you find valuable and meaningful. But if I were to tell you that what you were doing was following a long held tradition of our church called Evangelism, that might scare you a little bit. If I were to say that we need to be more Evangelical, many in the church would have panic attacks. But a calling to “network” and a call to have more “invitational events” that’s something I think we can manage! Whatever you want to call it; if we are going to move forward as a church in numerical growth we’re going to need to have some action. The passive approach isn’t working too well. I really believe we have something good going here in our church, now lets invite some others in to experience what we know to be so important!

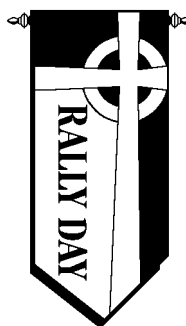


Waller all put in their time and talents in making the event a success. Besides the interesting information presented, lively conversation and delicious brunch; the

highlight of the day was the presentation of multimedia worship elements and ideas from First Baptist Pastor, Rev. Mike Ida.

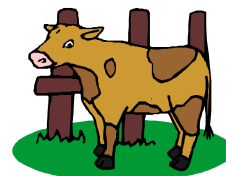

Start to dream about an entire year of attending church on Sundays without having any announcements made, asking us to go in the back and 'collect an Easter Egg or take a Turkey Feather or Pick an Apple' which contains a monthly bill to pay, so that we can meet our expenses.



Start to dream about a year where you can attend church every Sunday and NEVER hear any announcements about how we really need some help this month to 'get us through' or where we don't have to have a special meeting, to borrow from the Trust Fund to help pay our bills. Start to dream about a summer, when you can attend church on a Sunday and not be

reminded to send in your offering when you go away on your vacation. How does this dream sound so far?

The Stewardship and Missions Committee thinks this dream can come true. For nearly the past 10 years, we have had a budget that far exceeds our annual pledged giving amount.

Wouldn't it be nice if for once, we could manage to collect enough in pledges, that allows us to meet our expenses for an entire year? Last year our budget for 2011 was \$132,868.00 and the pledged amount was \$92,079.00. Whilst having a \$40,000.00 shortfall between our estimated giving and our projected expenses is not entirely new for our church, do we really want to have another year like that? Obviously, we can't all double our giving for 2012, although, what a dream that would be, to have \$184,158.00 in pledged giving, which would allow us to have LEFTOVERS for 2013!!!! Now that is some dream. But if everyone could pledge 50% more than last year, we would have pledges for 2012 of \$138,119.00, which would be slightly over a planned budget for 2012! We probably wouldn't even need to have a congregational meeting to discuss the budget, or at the very least, just a 5-minute meeting simply to approve it!!! What a dream come true that would be!!!



Just think...zzzzzz...an entire year without worrying about how to pay our bills. 2012 can be that year. Dreams can come true. Unfortunately, this dream may cost more than others. But we can always dream. Did we say 'wake up' yet? zzzzzzzzzzzzz

## TO PARIS WITH LOVE

Throughout the years which we in book club have been meeting, there has been an ongoing enthusiasm for the books of David McCullough. We have read *1776*, *John Adams*, *Truman*, and *The Path Between the Seas*. The publication of his latest book, *The Greater*

*Journey: Americans in Paris*, gave us the opportunity to add a fifth of his books to our list. It chronicles the years 1825 to approximately 1900 and recounts the experiences, achievements, and educations of a large number of Americans who saw Paris as the artistic and cultural beacon which would allow them to develop their talents beyond what was possible in their native country at that time. Essentially, the book consists of a number of mini-biographies of these individuals as well as a chronicle of the city of Paris itself including some of the great political/social upheavals which took place there during the 1800's. Some individuals stand out for me.

First, there is Samuel Morse. Of course, he is famous as the inventor of the telegraph, but he went to Paris to study painting. That is the field in which he first gained fame. Encouraged by his friend, James Fennimore Cooper, Morse studied and painted at the Louvre. In particular, McCullough recounts Morse's work in painting his *Gallery of the Louvre* which consists of his recreation of a gallery in that museum filled with 38 reproductions of famous works which appear in the museum. The idea for the telegraph came to Morse from his observations of the French semaphore system. Also, Morse became fascinated by Louis Daguerre's invention of daguerrotypes, the forerunner of photography.



Charles Sumner was a contemporary of Morse. He



went to Paris simply to benefit from the wide range of educational experiences available there. It was at the Sorbonne that he observed a group of black students who were “well received” by their fellows. This epiphany led him to become a leading abolitionist when elected to the Senate. In 1856 after a particularly powerful speech in which he excoriated slavery, he was accosted and beaten with a cane by a South Carolina congressman, Preston Brooks. Sumner returned to Paris to convalesce.

Since I was unfamiliar with the work of George P.A. Healy, it was interesting to read about his life in Paris. He became probably the most important American portrait artist of his day.

Elihu Washburne’s heroic actions while he was the American minister to France make a fascinating mini-story within the book. He served during the time of the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71. He stayed in Paris during the German siege when most other countries’ ministers fled. He courageously assisted native German citizens to be transferred out of Paris. Later, he performed with equal vigor and heroism during the disastrous period of the Paris Commune of 1871. His journals gave an eye witness account of the horror of that time. Interestingly, Washburne lived in Galena, Illinois. Here is his house.



During this time Mary Cassatt was in Paris studying art. She was first drawn to the work of the great Spanish painter Velasquez, but later was drawn to the work of the impressionists, and in particular Degas. The two became friends. At the Impressionist Exhibition in 1879 her work was hailed.

McCullough devotes a significant portion of the final quarter of the book to Augustus Saint-Gaudens. He studied sculpture in Paris, returned to the United States, and finally gained the commission for creating a statue of Admiral Farragut for New York City in 1880. From the studio he subsequently set up in Paris in 1897 he created numerous important works which are still widely admired. I found it interesting in reading McCullough’s account of the difficulties St.-Gaudens encountered in creating his statue of General Sherman, finally unveiled in 1903.

Well, this book is filled with the accounts of other

individuals whom I have not had time to mention, John Singer Sargent comes first to mind. It will enrich your appreciation of the men and women who emerged from that time; it will enlighten you regarding the cultural differences which existed between French society and that in America; it will help expand your knowledge of the sights and history of Paris itself.

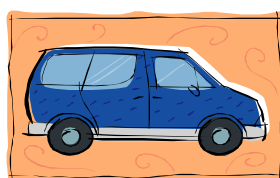
## It’s Fruit Time — Again!!!

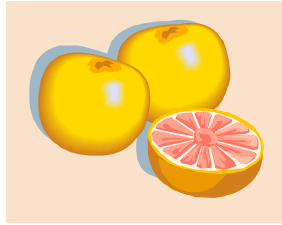

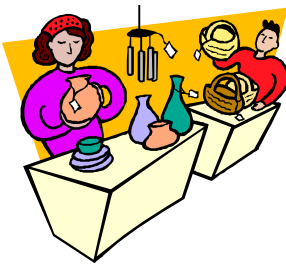
This continues to be as great way to help a local charity AND to give our church a significant boost. Remember (dream about it) -- THINK FRUIT !!

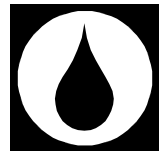

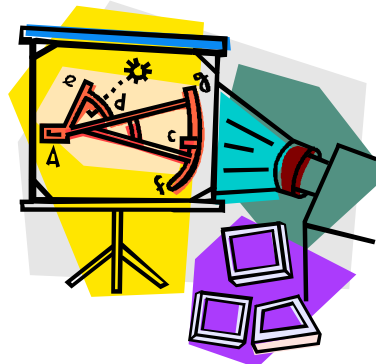
Cookie Sale doesn't seem possible that it is time for that already. The date will be Saturday, December 3rd. More information will be coming in the November Link.

September 20, 2011 Meeting of Church Council

Moderator Harold Morris called the meeting to order at 7:04pm. Others present were Pastor Scott McLeod, Bob Burton, Betty Gaiser, Jennifer Neis, Ross Phillips, Donna Riese, Ann Serpe, Bill Trewyn, Larry Waller, and Barb Townsend. Pastor Scott opened the meeting with prayer.

MINUTES August meeting minutes were presented. Ann moved to accept, seconded by Ross. Carried unanimously.

TREASURER'S REPORT Bill presented the treasurer's report noting expenses are a bit more than last year at this time, but giving is about the same. After some discussion, Bob made a motion to accept the report as presented. Seconded by Donna and passed unanimously.

COMMITTEE REPORTS Committee reports (Stewardship and Missions) were presented. Scott reported that other groups had handed in minutes for the month but due to computer problems in the office, not all were available for the meeting. Moved by Donna and seconded by Bill to accept as presented. Carried unanimously.

PASTOR'S MOMENT Pastor Scott reported he would add comments concerning various matters as the meeting progressed.

OLD BUSINESS

RAISE: Remodel And Improve to Serve Everyone Larry is extremely pleased with RAISE progress. At this point, specially fitted items (like the lift) have been ordered and are being made specifically for our building. In addition, the cupola will be wrapped in a few weeks at a lower cost than originally expected. Ann reported that over \$45,000 of pledge money has been received and it will collect some added interest from now to later next spring when it is needed. All of this is phenomenal news!! Jennifer questioned handicapped parking that would service both our church and the new Food Pantry building. After discussion, Ann will talk to the people in charge of the Food Pantry—they are meeting with the city and could inquire about parking on the street. It is possible the driveway entrance ramp from the street to the sidewalk (the one between the two buildings) could be used in conjunction with designated street parking for two handicapped stalls. In a related request having to do with parking, Scott asked that church members who do not have trouble walking please park as far from the church as possible. The idea is to keep the spots closer to church open for people new to our church.

Food Pantry Larry reported that he is also extremely pleased with the remodeling going on with the Food Pantry project. Some great improvements are being made to the building next door (including the cement between the two buildings, which will end the water concern we used to have for the basement during heavy rains). They hope to start putting up the shelving in a few days.

Construction Report. (See RAISE, above.)

Turnaround Church and Five Practices The all-church retreat at the American Baptist Church in Delavan on Saturday, Sept. 24<sup>th</sup> does not have the turnout the groups had originally hoped for. It seems many people have commitments and are not able to attend. They will continue to make calls in an attempt to get as many people involved as possible.

Federal Rebate on Health Insurance This has been received and we got a check for \$3,000! Chances are this will be available again and we will apply for it at that time.

Conceal and Carry Law Bob reported that after speaking with a friend who is a lawyer, it does not appear that our building falls into the category of "schools" since New Chance is not affiliated with a public school. We may, however, be seen as a youth gathering place which would then be considered a place where guns are not allowed. This will take further investigation and Bob was asked to contact a lawyer who might be able to give us legal advice.

NEW BUSINESS

Fund Raisers--Octoberfest After discussion, it was decided that we will sell raffle tickets for a "Dessert of the Month" opportunity for one lucky winner (desserts made by Ann Serpe for a year), as well as 3 pounds of cookies at the cookie sale in December, and a pumpkin locker hooking piece made by Barb. In addition, the following items will be sold at our tent area: door decorations with bells from Larry, handmade cards created by Jennifer, and pumpkins grown by Tom Bailey. This will all happen on Sat., Oct. 15<sup>th</sup>. Fund Raisers—Scrips Donna has not received any further information on this but will keep us posted. (The "Scrips" program makes gift cards for area businesses available for sale, a percentage of the cards going back to the church.)

Upcoming Church Events All-Church Retreat on Sept. 24<sup>th</sup>.

With nothing further, the meeting was adjourned at 8:02pm.

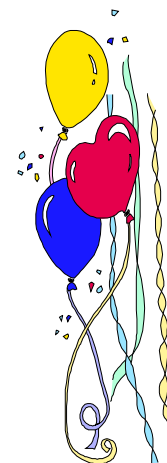
